Home visits set the stage for success

Shawano County's most vulnerable families are now receiving in-home visits, mentoring support and access to services. Collaborators include ThedaCare, Family and Childcare Resources of Northeast Wisconsin and Shawano County Department of Human Services. Family Services of Northeast Wisconsin's Shawano Area Early Childhood Partnership project received \$238,523 in grants for young families in Shawano County from the following grant contributors: our affiliate Shawano Area Community Foundation, Mielke Family Foundation, the Bright Idea Fund and Basic Needs Giving Partnership, supported by the U.S. Venture Fund for Basic Needs, the J. J. Keller Foundation, Inc., and our other generous community partners.

Trail extension increases safety

The City of Menasha Parks and Recreation Department has extended the Paper Trail, closing an unsafe gap and bringing two sides of the community together while encouraging outdoor recreation.

Known as the "emerald necklace," the Paper Trail is a 50-mile planned route through 11 Fox Cities communities and 20 area parks. A grant, totaling almost \$10,000 from Bright Idea Fund within the Community Foundation, supported the new crossing to

provide a crucial link between the west and east halves of Menasha at the intersection of U.S. Highways 10 and 114 that, until now, were extremely difficult to navigate safely by foot or bike due to the heavy traffic.

Caring for the Homeless

Grants from charitable funds within the Community Foundation continue to support organizations eradicating poverty and homelessness, such as Pillars' single-room occupancy program that allow clients to share a home with affordable rent. Counseling and other services are provided by Pillars, which is the result of a merger of the Fox Valley Warming Shelter, Homeless **Connections and Housing** Partnership of the Fox Cities. The Community Foundation supported the merger with a \$9,600 grant from the Briaht Idea Fund.





Understanding suicide attempts

One in eight of our high school students in the Fox Valley is attempting suicide, according to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's Youth Risk Behavior Survey. To understand and address this alarming concern, the N.E.W. Mental Health Connection, in partnership with United Way Fox Cities, is conducting a study of youth suicide-related behaviors, thanks to grants totaling \$10,000 from the Bright Idea Fund and
